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Was the Cross Retroactive?

The crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ transpired two millennia ago. All those who receive His death as the substitutionary sacrifice for their sins will be saved according to the Bible. But what about those who lived before Jesus gave His life on the cross? Can they be saved?

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Was the Crucifixion RETROACTIVE?

The crucifixion of a human being in the ancient world entailed suffering on the most extreme level possible. The pages of history thoroughly document this brutal and bloody form of capital punishment. Plenty of historical information is available regarding this pure savagery in detail. This practice of antiquity began with the Assyrians and Babylonians and was also practiced systematically by the Persians in the sixth century B.C. Grecia adopted the practice when Alexander the Great invaded Persia during his quest for total domination of nations. He brought it to the Mediterranean countries in the fourth century B.C. The Roman military implemented the first widespread use of crucifixion during the first century A.D. to punish insubordinate soldiers and enemy combatants. The practice became increasingly prevalent under the reign of Emperor Augustus Caesar, who used crucifixion punish criminals and political nonconformists.

The torture rack was responsible for the physical destruction of countless lives. It is impossible to estimate how many thousands of people died this way, but none is more identifiable than the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Some view His death as a historical fact, while others cherish it as a solemn sacrifice that became the means to a personal relationship with God. This belief introduces questions concerning the extent to which the crucifixion of Christ was effective. Did His death profit only those who lived after His crucifixion, or did people predating Christ also benefit?

Romans 3:23-26 provides essential insight regarding the scope of the sacrifice Jesus made by saying, "for all have sinned and fall short of

the glory of God, being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God set forth as a propitiation by His blood, through faith, to demonstrate His righteousness, because in His forbearance God had passed over the sins that were previously committed, to demonstrate at present His righteousness, that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus." Christ's sacrifice is unquestionably needed for every person of accountable age and mind who has lived on the Earth.

Understanding the effectiveness of Christ's sacrifice requires drawing insight from the Old Testament. According to the Law of Moses, those subject to that legal structure performed explicitly prescribed sacrifices as acts of atonement. Through revelation and obedience, the worshippers understood that God absolved them of their sin and guilt. Leviticus chapters 4 and 5 make the statement "he will be forgiven" on some eight occasions. The summarized the proper spiritual attitude of the faithful and obedient Israelite: "For as the heavens are high above the earth, so great is His mercy toward those who fear Him; As far as the east is from the west, so far has He removed our transgressions from us" (Psalm 103:11-12).

Although forgiveness is not a predominant theme in the patriarchal age, which is the period between Adam and Moses, it is implied. This accomplishment came through the sacrifices of blood regularly presented during that opening era of human history (cf. Genesis 8:20; 12:7-8). Abel offered a more excellent sacrifice which "had witness borne to him that he was righteous" (Hebrews 11:4). Certainly, this was not personal righteousness but uprightness imputed

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through his obedient faith. Job presented burnt offerings for his children should they have sinned (Job 1:5). Forgiveness was required even in the conflicts among men (Genesis 50:17), which suggests that pardon is necessary if one was to stand before the holy God (cf. Habakkuk 1:13).

The Bible greatly expanded on the concept of forgiveness under the Mosaic administration. The Book of Leviticus elaborated on specific aspects of sacrifice, requiring applicable knowledge. God articulated the theme of atonement, propitiation, and forgiveness recurrently through the balance of the Old Testament.

The chronology of God producing forgiveness requires learning additional information from the New Testament. While the Lord offered forgiveness of sin under the former covenant, the New Testament explains that the blood of Christ, in a procedural sense, was essential for pardon to happen. This introduces the primary question of how forgiveness could occur before the death of Jesus on the Roman cross. The answer is found only in an understanding of the nature of God.

Revelation 13:8 makes a statement that is incomprehensible to the natural mind. It declares Jesus as "the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world." This statement reveals that God planned the means of humanity's salvation before the creation of Earth. This fact coincides with the recognition of God in Scripture as infinite and eternal. This means He is not affected by time. Moreover, God created time and, by His nature, exists outside of time. He could appraise individuals preceding the cross as justified if they demonstrated "obedient faith" (Romans 1:5; 16:26). The manifestation of saving faith is the common feature for all people throughout human history concerning

the qualification to salvation. Those who displayed that specific type of faith were considered by God as reconciled to Him based on the blood of His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. This justification occurred chronologically before the cross, but Jesus still had to accomplish the

ultimate work of redemption. To do anything less would have been eternally unsuccessful regarding the salvation of mankind.

If the redemption of those living under the law of Moses had been achieved before the Savior's death in the total sense of the term, why was the death of Jesus even necessary? Many Bible readers consider the Scriptures to struggle with this consistently. Specific biblical texts indicate forgiveness before Christ's death, while another set suggests there was no pardon until after the Lord's death. It is reasonable to ask if there is a contradiction. Which answer represents the truth?

In logic, there exists a principle known as the law of non-contradiction. It says this: A thing cannot both be, and not be, for the same person, place, or thing, at the same time, or in the same sense. The last phrase is crucial to understanding this principle. There can be forgiveness and not-forgiveness so long as the senses differ. The question is then left: in what way are the senses different?

Without the historical incarnation and eventual death of the Son of God, there could have been no forgiveness obtained for sinful people. Romans 6:23 teaches that the paycheck for sin is death. The shedding of blood was therefore required for pardon from sin (Hebrew 9:22). Evidently, the blood of animals could only function symbolically but was insufficient to provide actual atonement for sin (Hebrews 10:4). The millions of animal sacrifices under the former testament were pictorial representations of the "Lamb of God" who was to come and provide an eternally successful sacrificial offering for humanity (John 1:29). Had Jesus not ultimately died at the cross of Calvary, those previous offerings would have been useless.

The two different senses can be summarized this way. In the Old Testament, forgiveness was contingently received based on the future death of Jesus. It granted a portion of atonement and remission for sins but could not provide eternal redemption. In the New Testament, the cross accomplished whole forgiveness.

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


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IS JESUS THE ARCHANGEL MICHAEL?

Charles Taze Russell and Joseph F. Rutherford established the Jehovah's Witnesses in the late 1870s. The group emerged from Pittsburgh, PA, and published their beliefs through the Watchtower Tract Society. Russell, raised in Presbyterian orthodoxy, disputed many ideas of mainstream Christianity, including the immortality of the soul, hellfire, predestination, the fleshly return of Jesus Christ, the Trinity, and the burning up of the world.

Among the most significant disagreements between mainline Christianity and the JWs concerns the person of Jesus Christ and Michael the archangel. The Jehovah's Witnesses believe Michael to be another name for Jesus in heaven, in His pre-human and post-resurrection existence. They say the definite article in Jude 9, referring to Michael the archangel, identifies Michael as the only archangel. Furthermore, Jehovah's Witnesses believe that the archangel Michael is "the Word" of John 1:1, and the wisdom personified in Proverbs chapter 8 is Jesus.

The name Michael is used five times in the Bible to designate a celestial being (Daniel 10:13, 21; 12:1; Jude 9; Revelation 12:7). It is crucial to understand that at no place in the Bible is Michael explicitly identified with Jesus. Furthermore, Jesus is undoubtedly never identified as an angel. In Hebrews, chapters 1 through 3, the author demonstrates that Jesus is superior to the prophets, angels, and Moses. Scripture shows that Jesus is the definitive revelation of God (1:1-2), the Creator of the universe (1:2), and the precise inscription of God's nature (1:3). After explicitly stating He is "much superior to angels," the author of Hebrews writes, "For to which of the angels did God ever say, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten you '?" The clear answer to this theoretical question is that God never said that to any angel. Mark 1:11 expresses this truth when documenting God the Father saying directly to Jesus, "You are my beloved Son; with You, I am well pleased."

Hebrews 1:6 declares that the angels worship Jesus. This reality leads to the logical question of how a created being would qualify for receiving worship. A created life cannot receive worship. When the apostle John fell at an angel's feet to offer him worship, the angel said, "You must not do that! I am a fellow servant with you and your brothers who hold to the testimony of Jesus. Worship God" (Revelation 19:10).

Hebrews 1:8-12 makes it copiously clear the reason angels worship Jesus. It is because He is God Almighty. The information of Hebrews 1 leads to the conclusion that Jesus cannot be a mere created angel - even the archangel Michael.

Michael, the archangel, is conceivably the highest-ranking of all the angels. Michael is the only angel in the Bible with the description of "the archangel" (Jude verse 9). Michael, the archangel, though, is only an angel. He is not God.

DID JESUS HELP LAZARUS COME OUT AS LGBTQI+?

Arguments made by those trying to justify behaviors explicitly forbidden in Scripture by using the Bible are exercising the height of brazen ignorance and disrespect. Some teachings from the religious LGBTQI+ community leap recklessly off the cliff of rationality into the valley of terminal blasphemy.

Reinterpreting biblical teaching on sexuality requires misrepresenting the writer's intent, a fundamental flaw in any language study. Popular pro-gay theology advocate Brandan Robertson cites John 11:43 as Jesus' endorsement of the LGBTQI+ community. He concludes that the call to Lazarus, "Come out," was given to encourage people to express their true selves. He contends that Jesus encourages Lazarus to "step into the light...be who you are...come alive." Comparably, Robertson maintains Jesus is calling current-day LGBTQI+ persons to "Come out from the tomb of embarrassment, remove the social and psychological chains that have shackled you, step into the glory of the person God made you be...just as you are."

This interpretation takes stupid to previously unknown heights. There comes a time when dumb on steroids does not justify rank disregard for the incontrovertible teachings of Scripture. Pro-gay theology supporters constantly undermine the traditional Christian education and requirements of sexuality. This fabrication has been occurring for decades. The flaw with their method is the glaring failure to implement thorough interpretive rules that aid in understanding the meaning of any text, not only the Bible.

The phrase "Come out" is a modern idiom for publicizing that you are gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender. The problem with interpreting the expression as a public declaration of personal sexual preference is obvious. This English language idiom has only been understood in that particular way since the end of the 20th century. Homosexual idioms are not capable of time travel. It is unethical to apply English words with an explicit connotation today and apply them to a biblical passage narrating a human resurrection that occurred two millennia ago. Jesus did not speak English, and imposing a contemporary social meaning on a 2,000-year-old text is anachronistic.

An idiom is an expression whose meaning is not inferred from individual words. For example, when somebody says, "When pigs fly," it is automatically assumed that the subject being discussed has an element of impossibility involved. Notice that the phrase's meaning doesn't emerge from the words pigs and fly. There are pigs, and flying is a reality. But pigs flying on their own is impossible. Combining these two words has an established meaning that modern English speakers understand to state something is unworkable.

Reinterpreting the words of Jesus and twisting them to mean that the Savior favored LGBTQI+ behavior is patently wrong. Pro-gay theology advocates do this because they recognize the church has a 2,000-year historical precedent of interpreting Scripture to declare that marriage is about one man with one woman becoming one flesh for one lifetime (Matthew 19:4–6). They also know the church has understood the Bible to forbid homosexual sex (Leviticus 18:22, Romans 1:26–27). That means same-sex sexual activity is a sin punishable by the legal outline provided in the Bible.

A NOTE OF CLARIFICATION

Many of the questions I answer are incomprehensible to some Christians, such as the previously addressed question in this section. I receive correspondence from many believers concerning the articles I write and the answers I offer. I have been accused of writing blasphemy and warned that I am in danger of judgment. I have even been accused of being a cult. While I appreciate the advice, many are missing the point. The answers I provide are from the questions I receive. I am targeting an audience who has no idea what biblical truth is. Jesus Christ is no different than any religious figure in history as far as much of my audience is concerned.

The reason these young adults have such a distorted sense of biblical Christianity is essentially the fault of those who would criticize me. If we were addressing the radically changing culture with a missional Christianity instead of an attractional approach, America would not be in this mess.

I will continue to welcome all questions that people might have - no matter how outside the boundary they might seem. If somebody has an honest interest in finding the truth, I will do anything to lead them to that place of ultimate discovery.


